Background and Objectives

The Dexter Cattle Preferences Survey was conducted from July 26, 2019 through August 24, 2019. The survey had the stated goal of market research for 2 Men & A Hen. Dissemination of the information gathered in the survey was expressed in the original posting of the survey.

2 Men & A Hen is a small family farm located in Central Michigan in the United States of America. It is owned and operated by Ryan and Christopher Thatcher. At the time of this survey approximately 20 Dexter cattle resided on the farm. 2 Men & A Hen registers their cattle with the American Dexter Cattle Association (ADCA), Purebred Dexter Cattle Association (PDCA), and Legacy. They do not register animals unfit for breeding. Their affiliation with these registries was limited at the time of the survey. 2 Men & A Hen acquired their first Dexter Cattle in 2017 from Lakeport Farms in Port Huron Michigan.

2 Men & A Hen understood that breeding and selling Dexter Cattle could be difficult and wanted to position the farm to have maximum sustainment of finances. It was decided that surveying people that currently own, have breed interest, or want to own Dexter Cattle could help determine the types of marketing and breeding that would be most beneficial to 2 Men & A Hen. This is the sole reason for creating the Dexter Cattle Preferences Survey. In most of the Facebook posts and emailing's the survey had the following header or comment to assist potential survey applicants understand the intent of the survey:

"Please fill out this quick 10 question survey if you have interest in Dexter Cattle. Our goal is 1000 responses. We are still pretty small with about 20 Dexters and are trying to plan our future farm operations in a way the positions us well in the market. The questions are all related to that market research. I will write a white paper on the results

as long as we (husband and I) get 500 - 1000+ responses which could be considered statistically significant."

The goal of this statement was to inform people seeing the survey of the background and objectives of the survey. The survey was shared from the 2 Men & A Hen Facebook page as well as Ryan Thatcher's personal Facebook page.

Data from the survey is very interesting and can be utilized to write informative papers and articles. The data will also be published within this survey to ensure that anyone who took the time to complete the survey may see the results as promised in the header of the shared survey link.

Survey Method

The method utilized was a self-select SurveyMonkey disseminated via email and over the social media network Facebook. Authors of this survey targeted current, future, past, and potential Dexter Cattle owners. In total 316 respondents answered questions within this survey. The question types in the survey included multiple choice, select all that apply, and short answer fill in the blank. Geographic nor personal identifying information was not collected by the author of this survey. Participation was not rewarded for completion of this survey.

The survey was disseminated heavily among Facebook groups. Target groups included North American Dexter cattle groups and miniature cattle groups. The survey was shared on at least 21 different cattle groups including: Dexter Cattle Historical Information, Miniature and Micro Miniature Cattle, Miniature Cattle, Traditionally Horned Dexter Cattle, Dexter Cattle Historical, Dexter Cattle Enthusiasts, Dexter Cattle Breeders, How to Market our Dexter Beef and Cattle, DEXTER CATTLE LOVERS, DEXTER CATTLE USA, Miniature Cattle Trader, Miniature Cattle Lovers Group, Micro Mini Cattle, Dexter Cattle People, All Breed Miniature Cattle, Mini Cow Breeders, ADCA Region 10 (Dexter Cattle), White Dexter Cattle, Pet Miniature Cattle Breeders, and Mini Cattle. The survey was also shared on several peoples personal Facebook pages and farm pages. The surveyor requested that the ADCA and PDCA share the survey on their Facebook pages. Legacy was not asked as the Legacy Facebook page had not had any posts since 2017. The ADCA did not respond to the request. The PDCA shared the survey at least once on each of their pages including the main page and each regional page. An email was sent to approximately 25 Legacy members with the same wording as the Facebook post and a link to the survey.

The surveyor's original goal for survey reach was 500 - 1000 respondents. Unfortunately only a total 316 people answered questions within the survey. 308 of the respondents completed the entire survey. The number of respondents was significantly less than anticipated. Reviewing the membership numbers of the Facebook Groups targeted shows that groups had a range of approximately 350 members to more than 7000 members. Exact member data is not possible to calculate as the groups fluctuate from day to day as members join, leave, and participate in multiple groups. The author believes that the survey had the potential to conservatively reached 10,000 individuals based on the number of members in all of the groups. This estimation takes into account the probability that members potentially belonged to more than one group.

Personal identifying information was not collected by the author of the survey. Location, gender, nationality, nor any other personal data was intentionally collected in this survey. The data available to the author does not allow determination of who answered each question. All surveys were date and time stamped in the results by SurveyMonkey. The date and time stamping is most noticeable in questions 3, 4, 7, 9 and 10 as they have free-text comment boxes.

This survey was funded by the family farm, 2 Men & A Hen. The use of SurveyMonkey required financial compensation totaling less than \$100. The author planned to spend \$0 on the survey; however SurveyMonkey only allows results from 100 respondents on the free plan. The author spent approximately 95 hours creating, promoting, and analyzing the survey. The 95 hour figure also accounts for time spent sorting and compiling data for discussion in this paper. Due to the limited resources respondents were not offered any incentive to complete the survey.

Survey Question 1 (Q1): What is your relationship with the Dexter breed? The goal of this question was to determine a frame of reference for the person taking the survey and determine if they were current owners (262 respondents), Past Owners (3 respondents), Plan to Own (34 respondents) have Breed Interest (11 respondents) or Other (5 respondents). People who answered other can be broken into two of the other categories based on their answers; Current Owner (2 respondents) and Breed Interest (3 respondents).

Understanding that the bulk of respondents are current owners allows us to understand the frame of reference for how the questions are answered in general. The ability to divide data out based on how the respondents answered question one may be valuable. Overall this questions value to the intent of this study is solely to determine respondent ownership data.

Survey Results – Question 2

Survey Question 2 (Q2): Do you own Modern, Traditional, or Legacy Dexters (as defined by the Legacy database). Choose all that apply; Unknown (81 responses), Modern (129 responses), Traditional (132 responses), Legacy (48 responses), or Unregistered (58 responses). If the accuracy of this data could be proven it may be useful in determining if selling cattle with traditional or modern genealogy was more lucrative one way or the other. Unfortunately Question 3 (Q3) renders the data above useless. Most breeders would need to register their cattle with the Legacy database to know if their cattle are indeed of Traditional or Legacy bloodlines. At a minimum the owner would have to have a very good understanding of the herd books and lineage of their cattle if they are not registered with Legacy. The author will presume that most breeders that answered their cattle are Traditional base this designation on something other than genealogy.

Survey Question 3: What Registry are you registered with? Choose all that apply; ADCA (176 responses), PDCA (75 responses), Legacy (61 responses), Not Registered (82 responses), Other (37 responses). The other category was dominated by the WDCA and several none continental registries. This question can be used as a clarifier to Q2 as people who register with Legacy would definitively know if their cattle met the designations of Modern, Traditional, or Legacy. Only 61 responses of Q3 said they registered with Legacy but 180 responses in Q2 indicated ownership of Traditional or Legacy stock. It is more likely that a person would know which registry they register cattle, rather than have a significant understanding of their cattle's genealogy and standing as Modern, Traditional, or Legacy.

Survey Results – Question 4

Survey Question 4: What interests you in the breed? Select all that apply; Dairy (123 responses), Meat (222 responses), Oxen (28 responses), Dual/Tri Purpose (154 responses), Heritage/Preservation (140 responses), Other (please specify) (56 responses). The Other responses have been summarized in the word cloud below (figure 1).


Survey Question 5: Does the lineage of Dexters interest you enough for you to consider yourself a preservationist? Yes (122 responses), No (90 responses), Unsure (101 responses). This question was of interest to 2 Men & A Hen in determining the promotion of their cattle. 2 Men & A Hen purchased Dexter Cattle with no known outcrossed/upgraded lineage called Traditionally Horned (as defined by Legacy). Presumably people interested in preservation would be interested in Dexters who's lineage as well as phenotype match the original breed standard. The responses to this question show that 39% of respondents consider themselves preservationists.

Survey Results – Question 6

Survey Question 6: How do you feel about horns? Prefer Horns (88 responses), Indifferent to Horns (95 responses), Dislike Horns (88 responses), Refuse to have horns (43 responses). The value of this question to 2 Men & A Hen is in understanding how people with interest in Dexter cattle feel about horns. The question was not worded using the term polled because 2 Men & A Hen do not own any polled cattle. Several cattle on their farm have been dehorned. The responses to this question indicate that approximately 28% of respondents prefer horns, approximately 30% are in indifferent to horns, and about 41% of respondents dislike or refuse to have horns.

Survey Question 7: What led you to answer question 6 that way? Choose all that apply. Looks (102 responses), Safety (145 responses), Personal experience (130 responses), Stories/Opinions of Others (26 responses), Other (please specify) (101 responses). The Other (please specify) responses have been summarized in the word cloud below (figure 2). The data gathered in this question is not user friendly as determining if the response was positive or negative towards horns (question 6) in not aligned with the responses.




Survey Question 8: Do you desire to have Chondrodysplasia (dwarfism) genetics in your Dexter herd? Yes (113 responses), No (196 responses). This question is valuable to 2 Men & A Hen as one of their two breeding bulls carries dwarfism genetics and will statistically pass on these genetics to 50% of his offspring. Therefore feasibly 25% of the calves born at 2 Men & A Hen will carry dwarfism. The results of this survey show that 36.57% of respondents desire to have dwarfism in their Dexter herd.

Survey Results – Question 9

Survey Question 9: What do you like/dislike about chondrodysplasia? A word cloud of these responses have been summarized below (figure 3). All responses can be found in Appendix A.

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Challenges

Several challenges arose during the execution of the survey. The survey was posted in several Facebook Groups which are described in detail in the Survey Method section of this paper. The original sharing of the survey did not display the header of the survey on every group page. One individual made several accusations of the author being biased. One individual trolled several of the shared posts asking the same questions on each post. The challenges of the survey were easily remedied except a negative discourse among Dexter Cattle owners regarding differences in opinion between ADCA, PDCA, and Legacy registries.

The original post was shared on numerous groups on July 26th at 2026 and did not include a preface to assist individuals in understanding the purpose of the survey. The preface only appeared on Ryan Thatcher's profile page. This issue was remedied on July 21st at 0935 by adding the verbiage; "Please fill out this quick 10 question survey if you have interest in Dexter Cattle. Our goal is 1000 responses. We are still pretty small with about 20 Dexters and are trying to plan our future farm operations in a way that positions us well in the market. The questions are all related to that market research. I will write a white paper on the results as long as we (husband and I) get 500-1000+ responses which could be considered statistically significant." This verbiage was added to all future sharing of the Facebook post by the author of the study. The post was shared by others that did not include the verbiage. If the author became aware of another person sharing the post the above verbiage was added in the comment section on the shared post.

On July 27th Individual 1 made several accusations that the study was illegitimate due to a perceived bias of the study. Their first stated concern was the study did not include polled status in question six. Their second stated concern was with question two regarding the

terminology Modern, Traditional, and Legacy. Individual 1 made it very clear that they do not believe in these designations and that they should not be recognized. They continued to post arguments supporting their beliefs and attempting to nullify the study based on these two stated issues. The author of the study requested that Individual 1 stop posting comments on the survey. They continued to post information attempting to prove the illegitimacy of the questions. After three attempts to stop the high-jacking of posts the Author blocked Individual 1 on Facebook making all posts by the author unavailable for Individual 1 to see and effectively stopping them from posting on the survey. It was never the intent of the study to become a format for such debates and the author felt blocking Individual 1 was the only way to prevent further discussion on the topics.

Individual 2 repeatedly asked questions on the original posting of the survey which did not have the preface statement discussed above. The questions asked were asked on four different Facebook Groups. They would ask a question about the survey and the author would respond. Individual 2 would then ask the same question on every group which they could see the shared post. After several interaction of the author answering the same questions it was determined that the preface was not visible to all users. The author added the preface stated above to the comment section of all of the shared posts. This did not stop Individual 2 from questioning the author and making vague comments which lead the author to believe they thought he was a spy for one of the registries. Individual 2 made several comments about the author only having cattle registered with the Legacy Registry. The author attempted to explain that he was new to having Dexter Cattle and not all of the paperwork for the other registries was submitted. This answer did not appear to appease Individual 2 and they continued question the author. To prevent further detraction from the study and decrease the authors stress Individual 2

was blocked on Facebook. This effectively stopped them from seeing any of the authors posts and stopped him from seeing any of theirs as well.

The negative feedback discussed above from Individual 1 and Individual 2 appears to be seated deeply within the Dexter Cattle community. The connotations of past fractures which resulted in the creation of the PDCA and Legacy Registries is still apparent among several Dexter Cattle enthusiasts on all sides of the argument.


The intent of the survey was never to mislead or create confusion to any member of the Dexter community. Every attempt was made to resolve conflicts with as little disruption to the survey as possible. Where corrective action was used it was done as a last resort by the author. Adding the preface to the survey and removing the aforementioned individuals resulted in no further significant concerns from Facebook respondents. The author was unable to remove the barrier related to the infighting among extremely loyal ADCA, PDCA, and Legacy Registry members. The author recognizes that there could be significant bias on the type of people that answered the survey based on question two and question six as these questions appear to be central to the negative discourse.


Q1 What is your relationship with the Dexter Breed?









Q5 Does the lineage of Dexters interest you enough for you to consider yourself a Preservationist?






